

# Can I just show my boarding pass on my phone? ~ [FAQ-suPport®]

Even when mobile boarding passes are accepted, preparation is key to avoiding problems[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\* Your phone must be powered on and functional at the moment you need to present your boarding pass[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\* A dead battery, cracked screen, or frozen app can cause delays and unnecessary stress[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\* To reduce this risk, it's a good idea to fully charge your phone before heading to the airport and consider bringing a portable charger, especially for long travel days[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\* Increasing your screen brightness can help scanners read the barcode more easily, and saving your boarding pass to your phone's digital wallet or taking a screenshot can provide a helpful backup if the airline app is slow or temporarily unavailable[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\*

Despite the widespread acceptance of mobile boarding passes, some travelers still prefer to carry a printed boarding pass, and that choice is perfectly valid[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\* Paper passes do not depend on technology and can be easier to reference quickly, especially for travelers who are less comfortable using smartphones[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\* Printed boarding passes can also be useful as backups in case of technical issues or as physical records for business travel and expense reporting[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\* Airlines continue to provide self-service kiosks and staffed counters where passengers can print boarding passes at the airport if they choose, so you are not required to rely solely on your phone[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\*

Security authorities, such as the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) in the United States, generally accept mobile boarding passes at airport checkpoints[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\* In many airports, security officers simply scan the barcode on your phone, while in others, your boarding information may be verified electronically once you present your identification[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\* For international travel, your passport remains the primary travel document, and the boarding pass—whether digital or printed—serves as confirmation of your flight and boarding status[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\* Procedures can vary by country and airport, which is another reason it can be helpful to stay flexible and prepared[+1]- 855- 510- 5815\*\*
